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Cold weather impacts energy use

IN RECENT WEEKS, we have seen some extremely cold weather in our area. There were many days when the

low temperature was in the 20s, with a high in the 40s. Our heating systems are working harder and longer to keep us warm, and this has brought a significant increase in electric use for many of our members. As a result, we have received numerous inquiries into why use is so high.

Weather is the single biggest driver of power bills. How much the weather affects your electric bill depends on many factors, including your home's original construction materials, insulation, air leaks and HVAC efficiency. Personal comfort plays a role too, as does the difference between the thermostat setting inside and temperatures outdoors. During extremely cold nights and days, your heating system can run almost constantly.

Members who depend on electricity for their primary heating source, as well as those who have gas furnaces, can see significant increases during extremely cold temperatures. A gas furnace uses an electric fan to move heat from the furnace and during extreme cold periods, the fan may run continuously.

What can you do to lower your energy use? Here are a few tips:

- Set your thermostat to its "auto" mode for the system fan operation and keep the temperature range between 66 and 68 degrees. If you get too cold, try dressing in layers before adjusting your thermostat.
- ► A humidifier can also make a difference. With properly humidified air, you can set your thermostat a few degrees lower and still feel comfortably warm.

Caulking and weather-stripping windows and doors can help with the invasion of cold air.

Check the level of insulation in your home. How much insulation is in your attic, basement or crawlspace? What kind of insulation is it? Is there an air barrier along with the insulation? The answer to these questions will determine how much you can save by adding insulation.
